This year has been characterised by a return to something like normal. Highlights have included:

- A return to a full lecture programme. This season's lectures have covered a wide range of arts-based topics and have been very well received, with most lecturers being given ratings of 'Outstanding' or 'Excellent'. We hope that you have enjoyed them too. Once more, grateful thanks are due to Margaret Martin, our Programme Secretary.
- As last year, a Day of Special Interest in mid-May. *Sir Stamford Raffles, Art Collector, Discoverer of Singapore* took place at Cucklington Hall on Monday 15 May and, judging from the feedback, was much enjoyed by everyone. Our gratitude both to Hennie Walton for her research, organisational and people skills and to Peter Evans for his innovative technical and projection skills.

- Our New Members' Lunch in November was well-attended and very successful as was our introduction of Christmas drinks after our December lecture. Pippa Schofield provided her brilliant sandwiches and snacks for both events. Thank you Pippa.
- After Alix Brooke stood down from countless years providing coffee and refreshments, we were unable to find a successor. So, ever resourceful, we instigated a Coffee Rota – around a dozen members willing to run the refreshments for 1 or 2 lectures each season. Alix volunteered to co-ordinate the team which has, proved extremely successful. Fervent thanks to Alix and her team.
- In similar vein, Anthea had help at tick-in from members other than the Committee. Special thanks to Sally Bolton and Fiona McEwan.
- Thanks and apologies must go to Flip Herring. Over the years, Flip has occupied just about every role on the Committee, as well as being an Arts Society accredited lecturer. Some 16 months ago, she offered to help out as temporary Secretary for a couple of months until we could find a permanent successor. She is still there. I can't tell you how grateful we have been for Flip's help.
- We opened the season with 165 members almost 100 fewer than before the pandemic. During the year new members have joined and, as I write, we are 172. Efforts to attract new members continue, helped enormously by our fresh new publicity leaflet. Very special thanks to our President, Sheila Williams. We hope to do much more in this area as and when we fill our vacant committee role for Events and Publicity.

Next year, we are aiming to run 2 Days of Special Interest – in autumn and spring, plus an Evening Celebration in late spring or early summer. Work has begun with the invaluable contribution of Georgina Scott, a new member whose energy and ideas have been outstanding. Thank you, Georgina.

We continue to monitor and develop our website, thanks to the careful work of Lincoln Waller, who has also led the Projection Team through startling amounts of technological change

After a very effective term as Projection Team leader Lincoln has now handed over to Peter Evans. Projection, like the website, never stands still and the demands on the Projection Team are ever-increasing. Recently, there have been several changes to the team and we would like to thank Clive Carsley and Mike Calvert for all their help and expertise in the past, and to welcome Mike Hall, Julia Holman and Peter Williams for all the innovative work they aim to do in the future.

Special thanks go to Mike Calvert, both for developing the projection procedures and for setting up our laptop.

Turning to financial matters, we are pleased to report that, despite all challenges, careful management has allowed our finances for 2022-2023 to generate a small surplus. You will see from the Treasurer's Report how this has been achieved, but we would like to emphasise the role that digital communication has played. We ask for your continuing co-operation in using email and the website, both of which are both cheaper and faster than paper and postal communication. Most of our costs do not vary with membership numbers, so more members equates to more control over subscription levels. Our lecturers have (just about) managed to keep their fees level over the past 3 years, though they are unlikely

to be able to continue to do so. To keep our finances stable, we propose to raise the membership subscription for the 2023-24 season by 4% to £51. Please also note the Treasurer, Andrew Torrance's comments on the GiftAid scheme in his report.

Pippa Schofield has taken on both Arts Volunteering and being vice-Chair. She has spent time this year reviewing our Arts Volunteering work in the light of the change in emphasis from 'Young Arts' to a more community-based approach. As a result, we are now supporting The Balsam Centre in Wincanton in their provision of art therapy for young carers. Our budget is provided by a £250 Community Grant from The Arts Society plus the proceeds from Book Draw.

Our central appeal, both for new and existing members is and remains the quality of our lectures – and I am happy to say that Margaret has prepared a richly varied programme for next season, details of which accompany this letter.

Running all these events and activities successfully depends on an enthusiastic team. The world around us is changing faster than ever and, if we are to ensure our survival, we need to respond to such changes. We need people to help, advise, to offer enthusiasm, expertise and time – however much or little can be spared. Please help if you can.
